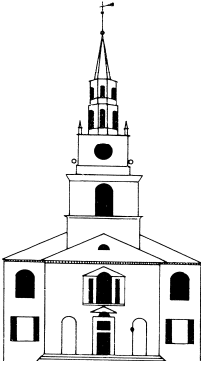

GIVING UP OR TAKING ON

As Lent approaches most people think about “giving up” something. Let me suggest that we “take on” something, whether it is volunteering with Community Lunch or Community Suppers, Emergency Housing or transitional housing, spending time with someone who is homebound and might enjoy a visit, or just speaking to someone at Fellowship Hour that you don’t know yet. You won’t have to spend any money, just some of your time. Your life will be enriched, and you may learn something new from an unexpected source.

PASTOR’S MESSAGE

Lent is a forty-day season, not counting Sundays, leading up to Easter. The designation of forty days reflects the scriptural accounts of Jesus’ forty days in the wilderness prior to his public ministry. Observances of Lent have varied throughout the history of the Church. What began as a time of preparation for convert’s baptisms became, and largely remains, a season of spiritual renewal aided by prayer, fasting, and almsgiving.

The word “Lent” -- from the Anglo-Saxon “lencten” -- means “spring.” Given that Lent begins on February 17 this year (Ash Wednesday), the suggestion of spring may sound overly optimistic to us. But as the hours of daylight lengthen, the weeks of Lent usher us toward natural and spiritual “rebirth.”

As we prepare to walk the Lenten path toward Easter, I am preparing a five-part sermon series called “Jesus Christ.” On the Sundays of Lent, beginning February 21, I will invite your reflection on the question asked about Jesus when he rode into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday: “Who is this?”

In advance of this homiletical exercise, I want to be clear about what I seek to do (and to avoid) in the coming weeks. I am not aiming to align the congregation’s thoughts on Jesus with mine. Rather, I hope to present an album of homiletical “snapshots” that will encourage examination and re-examination of the Jesus Christ we meet in Scripture. In their wisdom, the early Church’s leaders championed *four* Gospels. The Gospels, as I read them, are not so much biographies of Jesus as they are theological texts with particular leanings. In this light, a range of understandings of Jesus Christ will be featured on the Sundays during Lent. Some of the ideas might resonate with your deepest faith claims, others might challenge you. If we proceed with openness and inquisitiveness, I trust that the experience will enrich the spirit of our faith community.

However this experiment fares, I will continue to celebrate the diversity of faith in this place. I consider the range of theological perspectives present here on any given Sunday to be a sign of vitality, of a living faith that grows and changes over time.

So, who was Jesus? Who is Jesus? What do you think? What do you believe?

I look forward to winding down Lent’s path at your side.

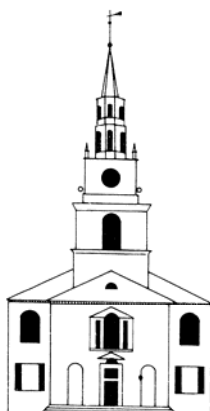
FEBRUARY “ONE MEETING” BOOK GROUP

There are currently about 95 volunteers who provide 24/7 staffing. The goal for most efficient operation is 120 volunteers. 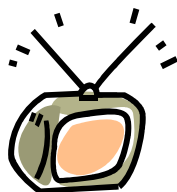

Volunteers are kept busy making sandwiches and keeping the soup crock filled. Other volunteers come in to bring desserts or help with clean up. We tend to serve the same folks on a daily basis. So by now we know each other pretty well and enjoy sitting around and chatting while we eat. We always welcome new volunteers to make sandwiches, cookies, be in charge, or just help out. In January some of us began creating take-home dinners for the Mary Johnson Children's Center. We are cooking in the Memorial Baptist kitchen on Friday mornings at 9:30. This is a 12 week pilot program, which we hope and expect will expand this spring to serve many more families with children at risk for poor nutrition. "Gifts of the Heart Kits" needed

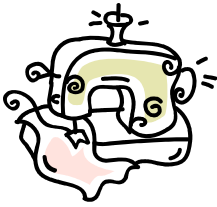
Hygiene and Baby Kits are urgently needed for survivors in Haiti. This is one very concrete and "hands-on" thing that church groups can do. Church World Service has issued an urgent call for Gifts of the Heart Kits.

In the face of natural disasters, violence, or grinding poverty, **Hygiene Kits** can mean the difference between sickness and health for struggling families. To assemble a **Hygiene Kit** you will need:

- One hand towel measuring approximately 16" x 28"
- One washcloth
- One wide-tooth comb
- One nail clipper
- One bar of soap (bath size in wrapper)
- One toothbrush (in original packaging)
- Six Band-Aids®

In areas of extreme poverty or following a natural disaster, **Baby Kits** help young mothers care for their newborn babies. To assemble a **Baby Kit** you will need:

- Six cloth diapers
- Two T-shirts or undershirts (no onesies)
- Two washcloths
- Two gowns or sleepers
- Two diaper pins
- One sweater or sweatshirt
- Two receiving blankets (one can be a hand-knitted or crocheted baby blanket)

Facilities Update

Facilities Update for February



1. **Fixit Thursday** for the month of February is February 4, 2010 at 9:00 A.M. We will meet in Fellowship Hall. As usual, a list of chores will be provided. A careful inspection of all radiators in the Church will be made.
2. As most are well aware by now, the hot water heating system for the east portion of Charter House has given us several problems last year and this year. There are two heating systems in Charter House (as there are in the Church) – a hot water baseboard system for the east portion of the house and a steam radiator system for the west portion of the house. Recent discussions have centered on replacing the hot water boiler or purchasing a larger system that could be used to heat the entire house; this discussion included the options of replacing steam heat with hot water baseboard heat, revamping the hot water heating (to an on-demand type of system), and eliminating an auxiliary hot water heater.
3. At the same time, three significant air drafts (crawl space under the east end of the house, southwest corner of the Church office, and north wall of the pantry) were detected and fixed. The drafts in the crawl space have been significantly reduced; further work will involve examination of the foundation under the south porch.
4. The Christmas supplies and decorations have been stored under the stairs leading from Fellowship Hall to the Sanctuary. An inventory was taken, with copies given to the Chair of the Board of Deacons, Director of Children and Youth Ministries, and the Office Manager.

5. In Fellowship Hall area, the cold air drafts in the kitchen area (four) were finally determined to be vents for the crawl space under the Fellowship Hall floor. The vents are being fixed (i.e., cleaned and oiled) so that they can be opened (in the spring) and closed (in the fall). Drafts were also detected around the base of the four posts (one metal and three wood); these drafts were sealed with caulking.
6. The double 2 by 4's that have been placed at the exterior foot of the three front doors to the Church have significantly reduced the cold air flow in the Narthex.

Wouldn't it be nice.....

1. to have a 2nd video camera for the Sanctuary
2. to have a flat screen television available for use in Fellowship Hall
3. to have DVD copier ; recently we have had some requests for copies of the service; this is especially true when there is a baptism, a memorial service, a special music presentation, and the like.

discuss different ways that we can help. I will be discussing with the children the opportunity to give something of themselves rather than give something up for Lent. More details to come.

The Junior Youth Group will once again be offering Super Bowl Subs for the game on February 7. Look for more details and an order form soon!

Thanks to the generosity of Dave and Jennifer Manner, the Junior Youth Group will also gather at their house for a Super Bowl Party.
